# ECO Groups Bring Joy and Connection to Older Adults

Creating a sense of belonging Camaraderie filled the air at the recent Nurturing Communities of Care gatherings this spring. Our Equity Community Organizing (ECO) groups in Bombay Beach, Calipatria, Niland and Westmorland hosted gatherings that brought together older adults for dancing, laughing, learning and great conversations.



When we applied for this project, we knew that community building would be a major component.

However, we soon learned the profound impact of our gatherings. For many older adults, these events marked the first time they participated in a community activity since the pandemic. By design, each gathering is accessible, safe and welcoming for older adults, encouraging participation.

As we begin to meet with local organizations to share what we've learned through these ECO group gatherings, we aim to reframe older adults in our community as assets and sources of strength, while promoting communal forms of care and ensuring everyone has a lot of fun along the way.

#### Relief funding update

Niland storm relief funding was set up for residents and businesses of Niland, California who suffered physical damage to their property during the storm event of September 2023. \$100,000 in relief funding came from <u>Citizens Energy Corporation</u> via <u>Imperial</u> <u>Irrigation District</u> to IVWF. IVWF served as the Fund Coordinator, administering the application and evaluation process. Applications closed May 17, 2024, and we're pleased to report that 54 applications were received. As of this date, all funding has been disbursed.

#### Imperial Valley Economic & Energy Summit

Advancing economic development in the Valley

During the three-day IV Economic & Energy Summit in Brawley in June, hosted by the IV Economic Development Corporation, experts and leaders from top industries and regions gathered to discuss project updates and opportunities in Imperial Valley, as well as projects happening outside the region that might be viable in Imperial. Among the topics were geothermal, solar energy, Lithium Valley developments, transmission-broadband advancements, and clean transportation.

IVWF executive director Roque Barros attended the Summit and presented on the importance of Community Transformation. He talked about the critical elements necessary to achieve a high quality of life for everyone in the Imperial Valley. He shared that community transformation is a long-term process and that economic development is a catalyst for community transformation. "It's essential that economic development efforts are inclusive, sustainable, and aligned with the community's values and long-term vision," said Roque.
